This workshop covering a wide array of topics relating to Open Science will take place virtually between the 22nd -26th March 2021. It will be the second of the three co-creation workshops planned on the project.

Workshop Description:

The course Open Science for Research introduces basic concepts on open science and its applicability in research. The course will explore branches of open science and zoom in on open data principles for research collaboration and innovation. The goal is to create an enabling environment for collaborative research by empowering early career researchers with knowledge and skills to access, use and share research data.

By the end of the workshop, participants will be able to:

NEMRA takes part in evaluating the 1st International Summer School on Survey Methodology in Uganda

NEMRA is taking part in evaluating activities of the 2019 1st International Summer School on Survey Methodology in Uganda (ISSU) and looking into the possibility of the

2nd school in 2021. The week-long workshop running at Bugema University from January Monday 27th- Friday 31st 2020 also includes 2 days training sessions on Institutional Data Management.

The Summer School was the first activity of the East African Scientific Research Network (EASRN); a network of 13 institutions including Muteesa 1 Royal University, Bugema University, Islamic University in Uganda, The Economic Policy Research Centre Uganda, Uganda Bureau of Statistics, Kissi University in Kenya, University of Nairobi, Makerere University, Ndejje University, Nkumba University, Wilsken Agencies Ltd, African Union of Conservationists and NEMRA.

The ISSU was held with grant support from the VW Foundation through Dr. Simone R Haasler (GESIS – Leibniz Institute for the Social Sciences PI), Dr. Marlene Mauk (GESIS – Leibniz Institute for the Social Sciences Co-Applicant) and Dr. Norman Mukasa (Muteesa 1 Royal University Co-Applicant). It attracted 53 participants from 25 Universities, 8 parastatal bodies, and 5 Private Sector Organisation. The participants were from Uganda, Germany and Kenya.

NEMRA is proudly associated with this network with a vision of establishing a Data Infrastructure in East Africa and Research Capacity Building in the region. Some NEMRA members who participated in ISSU gained skills in Survey Methodology and some will be participating in the Data Management training this week. NEMRA has also formed important networks with the organisers, facilitators, participants and other stakeholders of this capacity building exercise.

We are pleased to announce the first NEMRA Co-creation writing workshop under the Interuniversity Research and Innovation Community for the Early Career Researchers in Uganda project; IRIC-ECRU

IRIC-ECRU is funded by the government of Uganda through the Makerere Research and Innovation Fund. More Information about IRIC-ECRU can be found here

This programme will take place virtually between the 11th-15th January 2021. It will be the first of the three co-creation workshops planned on the project and will be about Academic Writing.

By the end of this programme, participants will have:

- 1. Obtained access to a pool of online training resources on academic writing and engaged with its content
- 2. Reviewed their academic writing approach, acquired new skills or ideas to enhance aspects of their academic writing
- 3. Reflected on their habits and effectiveness in academic writing and identified an action plan to build effective writing habits
- 4. Gained the opportunity to extensively discuss with other ECR and share approaches & challenges with academic writing
- 5. Discussed with other researchers from across institutions and disciplines about academic writing through a facilitated process aiming to initiate interactions and collaborations.

The programme will address a number of key themes, such as:

- 1. Creativity in Research, Identifying and articulating research topics
- 2. Writing a literature review
- 3. Critical writing, Analysis, Synthesis, Argument construction
- 4. Choosing the right journal, Academic writing skills, Peer review
- 5. Personal development in writing, Writing tools and techniques
- 6. Developing effective writing habits
- 7. Creating writing communities
- 8. Building resilience for writing projects
- 9. Style consideration in academic writing
- 10. Academic voice and going beyond academic writing to make your research contribute to society

The key objective in this initiative is to establish a community of early career researchers and academics committed to exchange and support each other with the view of anchoring researchers' professional development as a process to build research collaboration and building research capacity.

Why invest a week in your academic writing competencies?

- 1. Improving academic writing is a lifelong endeavour that does not just "happen"; it requires commitment, reflection and action.
- 2. Improving your academic writing does not need to be a lonely process but it can be enriched through exchanges with other researchers.

Call for Literature Review Concepts

The Research and Innovation Community for the early career researchers in Uganda (IRIC-ECRU) project invites teams to submit concepts for desk reviews of literature on Research & Innovation in Uganda.

IRIC-ECRU is a project run under the coordination of an inter-university team of investigators from Makerere University, Uganda Christian University, Mbarara University of Science and Technology and Mutesa I Royal University. IRIC-ECRU is in its initial stages of creating an inter-university community consisting of PhD students and early career researchers in Ugandan to synergise their research and innovations (R&I) ideas into coordinated and high quality outcomes for engagement and impact. The team operates under the umbrella of the Network for Education and Multidisciplinary Research Africa (NEMRA).

The purpose of the reviews is to identify gaps in multidisciplinary research, R&I ecosystem building as well as knowledge and technology transfer for development in the country.

Expected outputs of this exercise will be:

- 1. Review manuscripts for publication in peer reviewed journals
- 2. R&I ideas for IRICommunity members to develop further for funding.

Ideas may cover aspects including but not limited to:

1) R&I policy formulation 2) Human capacity building for R&I, 3) Intellectual Property Rights, 4) Research funding, 5) Technology and knowledge transfer/uptake, 6) Public engagement and impact, 7) Open science and data for R&I, 8) Academic institutions' role and practice for R&I, 9) National Research Agenda, philosophy and Development

Ideas are welcome from teams comprising of 3-5 PhD students and/or early career researchers (should have attained the PhD award not earlier than September 2015). Multidiscplinary teams are preferred.

African Scholars and the Pursuit of the Continent's Wellbeing - Professor Elizabeth Bachwayo Speech at NEMRA Anniversary

Professor Elizabeth Bachwayo gave the NEMRA 1st anniversary speech on the African Scholar and the Pursuit of the Continent's Wellbeing. The anniversary celebrations took place on 21st September 2019 at Uganda Christian University in Mukono.

African Scholars and the Pursuit of the Continent's Wellbeing:

There are basically four forms of scholarship

- 1. Scholarship as discovery. This is discovery of knowledge. Knowledge is power. Places pure/basic research and pursuit of knowledge for its own sake. Scholarship as discovery of new knowledge and publication is highly recognised for postgraduate award and academic promotion in universities.
- 2. Scholarship as integration. Scholars reach out across boundaries to create new knowledge. Involves synthesis of knowledge from different disciplines to find relationships.
- 3. Scholarship as practice. Application of knowledge to address national problems in different practice. This is popular outside academia. It is rarely emphasised for postgraduate award or academic promotion.
- 4. Scholarship as teaching. Almost every academic is involved in this form of scholarship. It builds on the other 3 forms. Quality teaching depends on the quality of the other scholarships that the teacher engages in.

NEMRA is one year.

The Network for Education and Multidisciplinary Research (NEMRA) was founded on Saturday 22nd September, 2018. **The anniversary celebration event is scheduled for Saturday 21nd September 2019.** It will be held at Uganda Christian University main campus in Mukono starting at 8:00 a.m.

It has been a fruitful one year of existence. The network membership has increased from a handful to hundreds of postgraduate research students and academics in Universities across Africa. These are from different disciplines including Social Sciences and the Humanities, Medicine and Engineering.

Core to NEMRA's existence is research capacity building for Africa-based scholars. 15 research workshops were, to this effect, conducted in the first year in Kampala and Mbarara. These covered a wide array of topics including; Research Philosophy, Academic Writing, Searching for & Managing electronic resources, Effective Defence/Viva, Academic Research & National Development, Making sense of Qualitative Data, and Research Supervision.

NEMRA was also formed to provide a platform for interuniversity networking and collaboration for quality postgraduate education and research in Africa. NEMRA's philosophy is that: "the whole is more than singular parts put together" in the process of demystifying the issues around doing academic research, enhancing professionalism and developing insights across a wide array of disciplines. The social media engagement of members has facilitated this kind of networking and peer support. Testimonies from individuals resonate phrases like "NEMRA has been my academic family....I have through this network gained confidence about my research...the PhD journey is no longer lonely....I have learnt a lot.."

The network has a grant writing team that is currently writing proposals for research funding with some already submitted for evaluation.

A lot more is expected in the second year including strengthening of discipline specific writing groups across regions, attachment of early career researchers to senior academics across the world for mentorship, engagement of stakeholders for uptake of the network's research outputs and establishment of partnership relationships with bodies, agencies and institutions sharing the same or similar objectives.

Professor John Mugisha, the Vice Chancellor of Cavendish University who facilitated the Saturday event took participants through the Anne Lee approach to research supervision (Lee, 2008). The workshop was hosted by Resilient Africa Network of Makerere University School of Public health.

The Sunday event was held at Bugema University where Professor Jude Lubega, the Deputy Vice Chancellor of UTAMU shared with participants about the ethical dimension of supervision, the role of doctoral committees and publications resulting from a supervisory relationship.

The participants had positive things to say during and after the workshops:

"I thank God for all this generous sharing. This is very helpful to us. I am currently on my PhD journey.

About the subject matter covered in the workshop, I realise that, the supervisor - supervisee relationship that was emphasized is a one to one relationship. But the case of a many-to-one relationship needs to be tackled. That is two or more supervisors knowing each other or not, with completely different philosophical orientations, supervising a student. How can the student get them to agree on a unified thesis theme in the event of continued divergences in their feed back? What about one being very active in reading the student's work and returning feedback while the others taking unbearably too long to reply. What should a student do?"

"The winner was on how to handle sex advances from innocent students not on basis of love but in search for marks. Though a student

can forgive you at a point in time, you as a supervisor you will never forgive yourself for being a predator. Using a personal experience and how the facilitator handled the whole situation indicated why you, Prof. John Mugisha, are a Vice Chancellor. Once again it was a great day!"

Giving closing remarks, Prof. Opio thanked NEMRA for organizing the workshop and requested it to organize subsequent monthly research workshops in Mbarara. The next workshop is scheduled for Saturday, June 15th 2019 and will cover "Searching for and effective use of e-resources with the help of Zotero".

Bishop Stuart welcomed the idea of networking with other universities.


2019 Annual Plan for NEMRA Events and Activities
